The UGRR Quilt Code was copyrighted in 1950 and again in 1998. In 1993, Ozella told most of the Code to co-author Jacqueline Tobin, a professor at Denver University. She enlisted Raymond Dobard, PhD, a quilter and Art History professor at Howard University. They wrote about our families' story in the book "Hidden in Plain View".

The great-granddaughter of David R. Strother, a SC plantation owner and the descendant of the Farrows, former slaves and abolitionist, Teresa Kemp's perspective with such diversity in her family history is as unique her message of delayed gratification, the "Golden Rule" and reconciliation.

She continues researching, documenting and teaching how to document your community or family history when she speaks or exhibits. The Farrow-McDaniel UGRR Secret Quilt Code was African patterns and symbols sewn in to quilts used as maps and messages used by Peter & Eliza Farrow (UGRR Conductors) to assist the enslaved to freedom. The Farrows were named as former slaves on a Glynn County Georgia plantation from 1844 to 1858 in 2 wills and slave appraisements.

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

The Farrow-McDaniel UGRR Secret Quilt Code



"The **Monkey Wrench** turned the **Wagon Wheel**, North up the road toward Canada. Follow the **Drunkards Path**, watch and pray, look for the Flying Geese by day and the **North Star** at night.

Follow the **Bear Paw** trail to the **Cross Roads**. **Shoofly** says dress up, put on cotton or satin **Bow Ties, Sue Bonnets or Bandanas.** Soon, you will cross over Jordan.

Look for the **Tumbling Blocks.** Nearby you will see a **Cathedral (Church)** with the **Dresden Plate** window. Now go in, you can sing and shout, **Thank God, You Be Free!**

You can get married, exchange **Rings** no more **Irish Chains** around your feet. You can build a **Log Cabin**; the women can dig and plant a **Nine Patch garden**. When you get hot, you can **Fan**. The men can go fishing in a **Sail Boat** and the children can play with **Pinwheels**. When somebody dies, weave a sweet grass **Basket**, put **Wild Flowers** in it and put it on the grave. You and your children can never be sold away again; it will always be Howdy, Howdy and never good-bye." "Thank God You Be Free!"
